PNINA

A wonderful discovery brought some comfort and added one more meaningful memory to a grieving daughter. Gail is from New York, and her mother, Pnina Shvartz, born 1935, was a survivor from Chelm, Poland.

She discovered N2N while she sat shiva, a Jewish period of mourning, after her mom passed away.

She submitted a picture of her mom (photo on left) and the search yielded this photo of Ms. Shvartz, an avid knitter, in a knitting class at a DP camp

(photo on right, Pnina marked in red.)

As most everything else Pnina had was lost, these few post-war photos were an important gateway to further solidifying her memory.





ELI

After getting involved with Numbers to Names, Samantha Bader, submitted photos of her grandparents, Eli and Miriam Kleinman. Sam stumbled upon an unmistakable image of Eli Kleinman alongside other men acting as police in the Landsberg DP camp (circled in black in photo on right).

After being liberated, Eli met his wife Miriam, and they were married while at Landsberg.

This discovery and special piece of history would never have been located otherwise.
